Committed to Making An Impact

The Reymann Foundation has a rich history spanning decades, marked by a significant impact on communities throughout Northeast Ohio. Over the years, our commitment to supporting programs offered by our partners has helped to make a positive difference in the lives of many individuals with special needs.

Some of our more recent contributions have included:

Continued development and support of Transition-To-Work Programs at both St. Vincent-St. Mary High School and The University of Akron. The training and experience that students with disabilities receive teach them life skills and prepare them for competitive integrated employment after graduation.

Ongoing partnership of Community Support Services, and Master Artist sponsorship at their Art of Recovery. This event showcases beautiful pieces of art, all created by participants in CSS' Expressive Arts Therapy program.

Continued support and sponsorship of Faith and Light USA, East, a ministry that tends to the spiritual and social needs of persons with intellectual disabilities and their families. The organization will be hosting its

34th Annual Retreat at Loyola Retreat House in Clinton, Ohio, and will attract participants from within Ohio, the Midwest, Eastern US and southern states.

Repeat sponsorship at the Premiere Partner level of the Akron Rotary Camp's Chili Open. This event is the main fundraiser for the Camp, which provides traditional camping experiences for children and adults with disabilities. The serene camp location, its amenities specifically outfitted for individuals with handicaps and the top-notch programming offered make the Camp a sought-after summer destination for many families.















Continued support of ArtSparks' Dynamite Duos program, providing children with developmental disabilities the opportunity to experience the art of dance and perform with their peers. This heartwarming program encourages friendships that go beyond the classroom.

One of the largest Endowed Scholarships at The University of Akron College of Education, supporting students pursuing careers in the field of Special Education.

Newly created Endowed Scholarships at both Archbishop Hoban High School and Our Lady of the Elms High School, focusing on students with learning disabilities and demonstrating incremental financial need.

Maintenance of Reymann Foundation-owned group homes, providing safe, dignified independent living environments.

Creation of the Father James J. Reymann Community Service Award, recognizing those who have made significant progress in improving the lives of the developmentally disabled community in Northeast Ohio.

The future of the Reymann Foundation is bright, bolstered by strong community partnerships and support. We continue to forge ahead with renewed vigor and dedication to our mission of making a lasting impact.





Reymann Roots: Reflecting on the Atlantic Foundry Demolition

Demolition of what remained of the Atlantic Foundry in Akron, Ohio, began on March 7, 2024. This effort to clean-up and remediate property led by the Summit County Land Bank is a positive action for the betterment of Akron; however it is a bittersweet event for the Reymann family.

The Atlantic Foundry was formed in 1905 by Charles Reymann and four fellow immigrant foundrymen. They named their new business the Atlantic Foundry Company as a tribute to the ocean crossed in search of better lives. A year later, the foundry building was destroyed by fire. Undaunted by their loss, the five men rebuilt the foundry. Their business grew rapidly in industrially booming Akron. What began as a small unpretentious foundry grew with and within the city. To meet the growing demands for iron, in 1910 they built a modern iron foundry. In 1919 they added a steel foundry and began a steel casting business. By this time Charles' partners sold their interests to him and he became the sole proprietor and President of the Atlantic Foundry Company.

Over the years since its beginning, the Foundry expanded its operations. The original force of 12 employees grew to nearly 450. The Foundry employed many Reymann family members. In 1955, Charles' first-born son, Charles, assumed leadership, followed by son Marcel in 1973, and finally Charles' youngest son, Thomas, became President of the Foundry in 1983. Unfortunately, due to the exit of tire manufacturing by most of the Akron-based rubber factories, as well as depression in the oil industry, declining foreign business and softening demand for iron molds and steel castings, the Foundry became unprofitable.

The behemoth foundry, once the largest in Akron and an icon among the city's industrial and entrepreneurial businesses, ceased operations in 1989. All assets were liquidated, and the blighted property on Beaver Street was sold. Though no longer having ownership, the memories and emotions tied to the Foundry remain firmly rooted in the Reymann family.

Still, change is a good thing. The 13-acre parcel of land in Akron's Middlebury neighborhood that once clinked, clanged and spit fire is silent, but is destined for new purposes. The demolition is a major milestone in the revitalization of Akron, and will undoubtedly bring many future growth opportunities for the city. And the Reymann family will take solace in the fact that they were, and continue to be, part of Akron's great history.



Charles and Salome Reymann believed in education, as was evident in the quality schools that educated their 16 children. Whether they endorsed schools in Akron such as Annunciation, St. Vincent's, St. Mary's or St. Thomas School of Nursing, or schools in nearby Indiana like Notre Dame or St. Joseph's in Rensselaer, their goal was to ensure each child obtained the training, education and skills they would need for the future. In fact, many of the Reymann children obtained master's and doctorate degrees to augment their undergraduate studies.

With the same goal in mind, and in tandem with our mission, the Reymann Foundation recently established two endowed scholarships at private high schools in Akron. We are proud to announce the creation of The Reymann Foundation Endowed Scholarship at Our Lady of the Elms, and The Reymann Foundation Endowed Scholarship at Archbishop Hoban High School. Both scholarships focus on students with developmental disabilities who require additional support to enable successful academic completion. Be the Lucky Winner of a Cleveland Baseball Quilt!


